How much is that homeless hound?

It's a question we get asked all the time. Why do you have an adoption fee? Surely you could re-home more dogs if they were free. We think our dogs are priceless, but what does it actually cost to rescue and rehome a dog?

We are determined to help every dog that arrives at our gates seeking refuge. That means we accept dogs regardless of their physical condition or age. Our small team of staff along with hundreds of volunteers work tirelessly to give our dogs everything they need during their time with us.

Many dogs arrive in good health and need little more than the basics: a vet checkup, vaccination, sterilisation, worming and flea treatments (and a microchip if they don't have one).

But plenty of dogs arrive in poor condition. Some the result of long-term neglect and abuse, others left untreated due to cost or age. Whether it's teeth, eyes, skin conditions, arthritis, lumps that need to be removed or costly specialist surgeries, we care and nurse them back to health, ready for a fresh start in a new permanent home.



The cost of care

Our annual cost of vet care and clinical supplies this financial year will exceed \$280,000. These costs would be a lot higher if not for the significant and ongoing support of Dr Greg Wilkinson and his team at Subi Vet Hospital. Dr Greg and his staff share our philosophy to treat every dog like they're our own and give them all the best care possible before they leave us.

Medical care is only part of the equation. The Dogs' Refuge Home is a large operation. We manage and maintain seven kennel blocks including two dedicated to generating income from boarding. We have two, soon to be three, quarantine blocks, two vehicles used for regional rescue and local pound pickups and maintain grounds set over five hectares.

We operate seven days a week, allowing dogs to arrive and be adopted every day. We do this with around 25 staff and an army of volunteers who contribute over 3100 hours a month.

All tallied up, it costs us around \$1560 per dog we intake and adopt. Our average adoption fee is \$500 or about one third the 'actual' cost of making a dog or puppy ready for re-homing.

Where does the shortfall come from that allows us to keep our adoption fee at a level we feel is fair? YOU. Without a full fundraising calendar, gifts and legacies and donations from dog loving people like you, our operations would not be sustainable.

While people are buying pedigree pups for \$5000+, we are asking on average just \$500 to help us cover a portion of the costs involved in taking in abandoned dogs, unwanted mothers and unwanted litters and giving them the best chance at a new, happy life.

President's Message

It's been another busy six months - Honey's Haven is now officially open, we've had two more COVID lockdowns, made multiple regional rescue trips, completed almost 600 adoptions, and we just celebrated National Volunteer Week plus one of our longest serving and valuable volunteers turned 85 just months after we turned 85.

We continue to take in more and more dogs from regional WA. We cannot leave dogs in regional pounds knowing that if we juggle, we can fit them in at our Home and save their lives. However, there are also additional costs with regional rescue especially transport and veterinary care as many dogs arrive in a poor condition with many never having ever seen a vet in their life.

Behind the scenes we are finishing off another quarantine kennel to house the regional dogs – this has been funded thanks to legacies. Our Masterplan is coming to life and we will continue to rebuild our facilities as generous West Australian's remember us in their Will.

These have been testing times, but there have been many testing times over the last 85 years. We always seem to make it through thanks to incredible teamwork from staff and volunteers and incredible support from our dog loving community.

We remain resilient because we all have a united, passionate and driven desire to save as many dogs as we possibly can regardless of what greets us each day. The dogs we take into our care have often experienced an undesirable life we cannot imagine. Yet, they arrive willing to trust humans again and that inspires us to ensure we find them all a loving home and

a life they deserve. Their resilience inspires ours.

When the rental moratorium and Job Keeper ended on 31st March we were inundated with surrender calls as many dog owners could no longer afford to care for their dogs or no longer had anywhere to house them. It was a sad and unsettling time, we went from receiving ten calls a week to coming in one morning in early April and finding ten surrender applications overnight.

Our surrender intake took a huge increase and our vet bills increased too as multiple dogs were surrendered due to their owners not being able to pay for necessary medical care which we then had to cover. Senior dogs especially who had lived with their family their whole life were very sad surrenders.

Thanks to Ruth from Shine Communications for helping us to get some important media attention we had a very busy few weeks of adoptions. There's no doubt when the community realised our plight they were there for us.

It's important to say we weren't alone – all the other rescue groups experienced the same and we worked together to take in and save as many dogs as we could.

Benji's new family recently gave us an update on this sweet boy saying; "We are gradually increasing his weight and his skin is nearly completely healed. Benji is a delightful doggie and we both adore him. He follows us everywhere and wants our company all the time."

Short term fostering a winning formula for our dogs

Dusty and Sophie, like many of our volunteers, go above and beyond to support our dogs. They are regular dog walkers, have dashed off on regional road trips to rescue dogs and regularly open their home to foster dogs in need. This is Sophie's story.

Dusty and I fell into short-term fostering a few years back - it was all rather by accident. We'd just finished the afternoon toilet doggies when we were introduced to senior pooch Neo in the clinic office. We were told that Neo, a kelpie x, was feeling rather poorly, and had shut down to the point where he was hardly eating and refusing to drink. He needed monitoring overnight and being late in the day, it was going to be tricky finding foster carers at such short notice. Could we take him? I still remember our feelings of trepidation as we bundled Neo into the car and brought him home. What if our very first foster doggie refused to drink or worse still, didn't make it?

Fast forward a few years, we've fostered a few dozen doggies - most of them overnight (we would drop them off at the Home on the way to work and collect them again on our way home) and some for a week or two at a time.

Most of our foster charges either struggle in kennels (stressy Staffies in particular); are too old or young to spend the night in kennels; or are recovering from surgery, illness or have reached the Home severely neglected, and need overnight monitoring. The vast majority simply need to decompress, cuddle and catch up on sleep.

With our overnight guests, we keep things very simple - we let them have a good sniff around the house and settle in as we prepare our dinner (they have usually already had theirs), watch some TV (by that stage they are snoozing), and take them for a quick toilet break before bed. Then it's a brief morning toilet walk, before heading back to the Home for their breakfast and a nice long walk with a volunteer.

For those doggies who have stayed longer with us, we always seek information from the Home on the dog's needs e.g short/ long walks, dog social/avoid other dogs etc and go at the dog's pace - for some, this has allowed us to go on treks in the Hills and to dog-friendly taverns and cafes; for others, our walks have been at quiet times around our neighbourhood.

Predictably, we have fallen in love with all the doggies who have come into our home, even those who have only spent the night with us. Neo will always be a stand-out (he was fine by the way - once home with us we worked out that he liked chicken broth and after a marathon sleep, he was much improved by the following day); Hulk holds a special place in our heart; and this year alone we have had the chance to look after the angelic Harlow (or Halo as we liked to call her) and Sargent (whose new family we are in contact with and

Last month we had a visitor to the Home that caused quite the commotion, and for all the right reasons ...

Our team could not believe their eyes when a spritely, lean and happy Abby trotted through the gate. You would be forgiven for not recognising her as the same dog who tipped the scales at 36.5kg when she first arrived back in September 2020.

Seven-year-old Abby was surrendered by an owner who had loved her almost to death. She was exhausted from carrying around her own weight, and was at high risk for arthritis, heart disease, liver disease, cancer, and more. Abby had the best personality but no quality of life.

Abby has now lost over 20kg - a huge achievement and a testament to the love and support provided by her amazing new owner. There were tears of joy and we could not wipe the smiles from our faces for the rest of the day!

What a great kindness to take on a senior dog and transform her life for the better in so many ways.
