Paging Dr Dog... Emergency Vet Bills Spike at the Dogs' Refuge Home

Here at the Home, we have a saying, "it's always the sweetest dogs that have the biggest medical issues." We never want to say 'no' to a dog that can be saved on medical grounds, but this year, that philosophy has led to a huge increase in medical bills for specialist appointments and emergency care.

Since January 2023, we have spent over \$80,000 on emergency and specialist care. To put this into perspective, this is four times our budgeted ANNUAL cost of \$20,000.

On emergency and specialist care, this year so far, we have spent roughly;

Hearts	\$12,000
Legs and feet	\$22,000
Obstructions and gastro	\$17,000
 Parvovirus	\$13,000
Mum and pups	\$5,000
Trying to save dogs that didn't make it	\$11,000

These figures do not include the standard care for our dogs, which is around \$25,000 per month. For this we are so incredibly lucky to have the support of our Veterinary partners; Subiaco Veterinary Hospital, who offer us massively reduced rates and allow us to keep our dogs happy and healthy. We would be lost without them and would like to take this opportunity to say a huge thank you to Greg Wilkinson and the team for their ongoing support.

> So, what falls under the umbrella of 'specialist or emergency care'? Meet some of our latest special cases...

> > Lisa, our gorgeous greyhound mix, was returned into our care after sustaining a traumatic injury to her leg. It was devastating to see her in pain, and even though we knew she was suffering, she kept her sweet and loving nature. She is now recovering well in foster care. Cooee, pictured left, our charismatic Dingo required Tibial Plateau Leveling Osteotomy (TPLO) surgery, he has just received the all clear to be able to head out on his beloved bush walks again.

Mum's Honey and Minnie both required

caesareans, they and their pups have all now found loving homes. Our poor, darling 'J' puppies, **Juliet, Jasper, Jemima** and **Jessica** tested positive for parvovirus shortly after arriving into our care. After a 4 day vet stay, they were back up on their feet causing mischief, and have now all found forever homes. Little Red, a 6 week old staffy pup, arrived to us from a breeder with glaucoma so advanced he needed his eye removing. He bounced back like a trooper and was adopted. These cases all required around the clock care, and we are very grateful to Perth's emergency vets that help our dogs out in their hour of need.

We are so enormously grateful to everyone that donates, enabling us to be able to keep saying 'yes' to these special cases. Without you, it would not be possible. If you are in a position to make a tax-deductible donation this year, we and the dogs would be so thrilled.

If donating is not in the budget, there are other ways you can help. We are also always on the lookout for foster carers to take in these sweet dogs as they recover. All costs are covered by the Refuge, including all medical expenses, food, toys and bedding. All you need is time and love to share. You can also join our volunteer army and help us transport these lovely pooches to their various vet appointments.

Once the dogs have recovered, we are then looking for families with hearts big enough to take them in. Many dogs that receive medical treatment in our care make a full recovery, and are just like any other dog. Others will need ongoing care, so we are always on the hunt for those extra special homes willing to take in a special needs dog.

Please help us continue to care

Due to these high medical expenses and other daily costs, the average cost to our Home to take in and rescue a dog is over \$1500. While people are buying pedigree pups for \$5000+, we are asking on average just \$500 to help us cover a portion of the costs involved in taking in abandoned dogs, unwanted mothers and unwanted litters and giving them the best chance at a new, happy life.

The things that stand out have been the incredible support we've received from our amazing dog loving community, the generous souls who remembered us in their wills, and the never-ending number of requests from local and regional pounds and individuals begging us to take in the unwanted dogs in their care.

One of these dogs Peppa we took in late March, she was very young, heavily pregnant, shut down and bewildered, she was still a pup herself and about to give birth. Finding a foster always takes a little time so each night different staff members took her home in case she went into labour. We eventually found her the perfect foster home with one of our long-term, and very experienced, volunteers Suzanne.

As happens with most pregnant mums, our darling Peppa started to give birth at midnight and by 7am had popped out 11 gorgeous little pups. She was never going to be able to feed that many pups by herself, so an army of volunteers supported Suzanne with help feeding and cleaning, vet visits etc. It takes a caring team to achieve what we do supporting our dogs and each other through the highs and the lows.

With more dogs than ever needing to be rescued, and a slower than usual number of adult dogs being adopted, we've got a busy 6 months ahead of us. We can only save those dogs in need when our current dogs are adopted or find foster homes.

So, in summary, we've achieved lots in the last six months, we were only able to do it with your help, and there is still so much more to do.

Every weekend we see Jono either on a roof cleaning out gutters or on a ladder pruning trees, we see Lynda and Pam weeding in our cemetery every Friday and mid-week we see lan on the Dingo and fixing all the problems we have.

Regional Rescue

This is an incredible story about one very lucky dog, Floss, and the huge heart and compassion of our long term volunteer, Ruth Gourley, who made this happen. Ruth was contacted by one of the Kununurra rangers who was desperate to see four-year-old Border Collie, Floss saved from being euthanised.

Ruth wanted to bring Floss to Perth, where she had a better chance of being adopted, so she contacted Mr Horsman, a long-haul truck driver. Thankfully, Mr Horsman didn't mind Floss jumping on board.

Saved from certain death and riding alongside truckie Barry "Bushy" Horsman, Floss went on a mammoth journey across the country that has allowed her to see more of this vast continent than most Australians.

It was meant to be a straightforward trip down Western Australia for the new best friends Mr Horsman and Floss, but unforeseen circumstances sent them around the nation, gallivanting through the outback and stopping off in major cities. We were all following the journey, as Ruth and Barry made sure to keep us updated every step

Heading south, the journey started off well, with the pair making it to Geraldton, around 420 kilometres north of Perth. But then the floods in the east sent Mr Horsman and Floss back up to Kununurra to pick up some important cargo. The pair were tasked with delivering mining camp huts Victoria to serve as emergency accommodation for those affected by the floods. Four weeks on and many pit stops and 20,000km later, the pair finally made it to Perth.

Floss was greeted by Ruth and a group of loving supporters after following her amazing journey on Facebook, of course it didn't take her long at all to find her forever home! Floss goes to the beach every day, her family says she is just wonderful and they are so in love with her.

Floss is not the only lucky pooch, Ruth started Flossie's Flyng Fund to continue saving other deserving dogs from regional areas just like Floss.

Ruth will never stop when it comes to rescuing dogs, she will try all avenues and we are in awe of her dedication. Ruth, we couldn't love you more!



Puppies, Puppies and MORE Puppies



From January - May this year, we have rescued 174 puppies! That is a 33.6% increase from the 120 puppies surrendered in the same period in 2022.

Puppies often arrive without ever having seen a vet or receiving medical treatment, unfortunately we've experienced multiple cases of Parvovirus this year and have spent \$13,000 saving dogs from the virus.

Despite our best efforts at educating and spreading the importance of responsible pet ownership and desexing your pets, we have experienced more surrender applications of pregnant dogs and puppies than ever before.

We urge all dog lovers to desex their pets to avoid 'accidents'!
