### The reality of WA's homeless hounds crisis

We want to start by saying thank you for being a dog lover and for supporting the Dogs' Refuge Home as we battle through one of our toughest years ever when it comes to the volume of dogs needing our help.

The WA homeless dog crisis is out of control, rescues are struggling under crippling intake requests. Countless times this year, Perth's smaller rescue groups have had to close their doors entirely to intake, this is not a long-term solution because if the rescues are full, then the pounds are full, where do the homeless dogs go?

Last month, in two weeks alone we took in 36 dogs from one single pound. To give some context, we accept dogs from around 40 different metro and regional pounds, plus private surrenders, and our usual intake is around 28 dogs per week.

We currently have 170 dogs in care, on the same day in April 2022 there were 136 dogs under the Home's ownership, in April 2021 that number was 106, and in April 2020, just 76.

We cannot keep building kennels, and need the communities help to address this issue.

We are so incredibly lucky to have the 15-year support of Subiaco Veterinary Hospital and their team of dedicated vets, but even with their remarkable generous rates, our vet bills are set to top \$400,000 this financial year. In the past months we have battled alongside dogs suffering with pneumonia, ectopic urethras, cruciate ruptures, cancers and so much more. Parvo virus once again runs rampant in the community, and we do our best to save every little life we can, but it comes at an enormous cost. With your generous support, we can continue our policy of never declining the intake of a dog based on medical grounds.

> So how can we break this cycle of dogs needing our help? There is a distant light at the end of the currently very dark tunnel.

The first major positive changes we hope to see are from the Residential Tenancies Amendment Act 2024. With so many dogs needing our help, it is devastating for us to have to try and find homes for dogs that already have loving homes, families who have had to give them up because they are unable to find

a rental property willing to allow pets. The changes, set to come into effect early in the new financial year, will mean in most cases pets are allowed, with permission, and landlords and agents cannot refuse without

'good reason'.

We are also heavily relying on the community to spread the word about vaccination and sterilisation. In the past years, our sterilised vs unsterilised intake statistic has risen from 50/50 to 75% unsterilised. Responsibly bred dogs will not be found on Facebook, Gumtree or in a pet shop.

There are too many dogs in WA, and anyone irresponsibly backyard breeding, or purchasing dogs from these 'breeders' is adding to the problem.

There are more grants every year targeted at this issue, offering low cost or cost free desexing for those who need it most. Whenever we have a litter of pups surrendered, we offer to desex mum cost free even if the owner does not wish to surrender her to do our part in ending the cycle of accidental litters.

Despite the challenges of the past year, our team remain dedicated to our mission to be a safe place for WA's vulnerable dogs until the time comes that we are no longer needed. Whether staff or volunteer, our amazing team put their heart and soul into our mission every single day. Thank you for being with us for the journey, for supporting our Home and giving your love to our precious dogs.

Just before Christmas we celebrated the opening of two brand new kennel blocks including Freddie's Lodge. A key focus for our team here has been to improve the living conditions for our precious residents while they wait for their forever home.

We can proudly say these new kennels are very comfortable, they have underground heating and cooling, have relaxing music playing during the day and the dog's outlook is beautiful trees, manicured lawns and even a beach mural.

Our dogs are safe and loved and sadly for a lot of them, it's a huge improvement from the place they came from.

Freddie's Lodge was only possible thanks to the outstanding generosity of the Chang Family. Pat has been a dog walking volunteer with us for over twenty years and has adopted 10 dogs, many of which have been long-term residents. Pat has recently recruited her husband Jimmy to help with maintenance and this amazing couple donated enough to cover the cost of building one whole kennel block! We are over-whelmed by their generosity and filled with gratitude.

The second kennel block has been funded by bequests left to us by many generous souls. # Little Lady's Story

The moment I met Little Lady, I knew she couldn't stay here in a kennel. She was no heavier than 5kg and had tumors hanging from her belly, the largest was almost touching the ground.

Subiaco vet clinic performed surgery soon after she arrived in the care of DRH. As she was 11 years old and in an awful condition, we assumed she'd be a palliative care foster dog. Our goal was to make her comfortable and just enjoy however much time we had together.

After two major surgeries, a bilateral mammary chain removal, multiple tumor removal, sterilisation, a prolapse, and teeth removal, Little Lady is like a brand new dog.

Little Lady was found dumped in bushland by rangers, though it seemed as though she'd never been outside the four walls of a backyard, everything was new for her. Walking on a lead was foreign and seeing people and other dogs is still quite triggering for her.

Whilst she isn't interested in making new doggy friends, she quickly took to Iver, her doggy brother and my two cats, Frank and George.

Little Lady is the most perfect dog in my eyes. Every day I am filled with gratitude that I could be so lucky to love her. To share my life with this fiery, little Chihuahua who consistently surprises me with her larger than life personality and hunger for life is simply the best.





It continues to RAIN puppies at the Dogs' Refuge Home

In our 2023 winter Chinwag we reported that we had rescued 174 puppies, up 34% from the same period in 2022.

Well, guess what? This year we've taken in even MORE, 189 pups have come through our gate, another 8.6%, and that not counting those in the tummies of our two current pregnant mums.

Once again, despite our best efforts at educating and spreading the importance of desexing family pets, we have experienced more surrender applications of pregnant dogs and puppies than ever before.


