End of Financial Year Appeal

A whirlwind start...

...to a very special year!

As we rush towards our 90th Anniversary this October, it's already been a very exciting start to the year for us at the Dogs' Refuge Home. With every low there's been a high to match, and we are focussed on moving forward to create a better future not just for dogs in our care, but dogs across WA.

We are so enormously grateful to have received a generous grant from Lotterywest to support our huge redevelopment project which you can read about on page 3, but we also wanted to take a moment to share a few stories with you to show where your donations go-directly to the care of our dogs. Without you, we would not be able to say 'yes' to these cases without hesitation, and so many dogs would be left without hope. We are anticipating our vet fees to surpass \$500,000 this financial year, and that's with the incredibly generous, reduced rates provide to us by our friends at Subiaco Veterinary Hospital.

Meet a few of our very special cases

At just 4 months old, little **Annie** (main pic.) was purchased from a pet shop on the Sunday, broke her leg on the Monday, and arrived into our care on the Tuesday as her owners could not afford surgery.

> She needed emergency surgery to save her leg, costing over \$5000.

This sweet and brave little girl is recovering amazingly in foster care and will be looking for a forever home soon.

At 7 months old, timid **Bunnie** (below) arrived into our care from a local pound with a worrying, painful looking congenital defect. After multiple x-rays and exploring all options, it was decided amputation was in this darling girl's best interest to live a happy, pain free life. Bunnie entered our foster care program where she will spend her recovery before being made available to adopt. Her care will cost several thousands of dollars, but will be worth every cent to change her life for the better.

> Maggie (right) arrived at the Dogs' Refuge Home heavily pregnant from a regional pound. As the Ranger's noted she was from a multi dog household, we were immediately concerned that this little

lady may have an XL size baby daddy, which would make delivery extremely dangerous. Unfortunately, our suspicions were

correct, and an ultrasound revealed three enormous puppies. If she had been left to deliver naturally, neither she nor the pups would have made it. As soon as she started showing signs of early labour, she was rushed for an emergency caesarean, where we welcomed three beautiful, healthy, very large puppies! This life saving procedure came in at over \$4500, a cost which is well over the eventual combined adoption fees for the whole family, even before we start thinking about vaccinations, microchipping, food and sterilisations.

Heartbreakingly, we are seeing an increase of neglect cases, with many dogs requiring immediate veterinary attention upon arrival.

From severe skin conditions to untreated traumas and emaciated bodies, these dogs are the silent victims of irresponsible backyard over-breeding and increasing cost-of-living pressures.

Whilst it can be depressing to see dogs suffering, we have to remember that these are the lucky ones, and that once they are in our care, they are safe. We couldn't do this important work without your support.

Redevelopment Update



We were overjoyed to have received a \$2,287,440.00 support pledge from Lotterywest last year which will allow for major redevelopment to 5 key areas of our Home, and we are full steam ahead with the progress with a completion goal of our 90th Anniversary this October.

A \$50,000 portion of the Decompression Kennels will also be supported by the Animal Welfare Grant Program, administered by the of Primary Industries and Regional Development, along with a \$50,000 donation towards our exercise yard from our long-term volunteers, adopters and supporters, the Chang family.

The first portion of the project to be complete was 'The Playground'our amazing, enriching Agility yard which the dogs are loving. This was opened on Valentine's Day with a special musical event.

Huge thanks to the Landscape Australia team, especially Erez and Aaaron, for their patience and dedication to listening to our every desire on this bespoke project.

The yard also features custom water fountains by our long term supporters Envrioplumb, and recycled agility equipment to keep the dogs brains and bodies busy.



** Puppies & Pregnancy

BREEDING FOR GREED: When there are no buyers, who pays the price?

Every edition of Chinwag we seem to give a puppy update that gets more and more unbelievable.

Below is a table which highlights just how rapidly puppy intake has grown over the past four years. This year we are on track to match or likely exceed the huge 2024 total.

Calendar Year	No. of Pups Under 6 months
2021	238
2022	413
2023	463
2024	673

This is a sad illustration that the situation for WAs homeless hounds is set to get worse before it gets better, as more and more people choose not to sterilise family pets and continue to backyard breed.

Breeding is no longer a reliable income stream, gone are the days where you can make a tidy sum selling a litter of ten pups for a few thousand dollars each.

The market is oversaturated with irresponsible, careless individuals breeding for greed and time and time again we receive calls from people with litters of pups, now six or eight months old, who have never been socialised, never seen a vet and now they need our help. Puppies are arriving into our care emaciated or with serious medical conditions. Pictured is William, who arrived with a severely infected eye which could not be saved, and Mui Mui, who arrived with just one ear canal and ¼ of the size of her brother.

We are seeing a huge rise in the amount of heavily pregnant mums entering the pound system. Where we used to see three or four a year, now we are often taking in several pregnant dogs a month. Some of these poor girls are arriving in states of neglect that are difficult to see. Pictured are Candy, who arrived to us with her two young pups earlier this month in an emaciated condition, and **Cream**, whose story you can read below.



Why our foster carers mean so much to us

Kennels are no place for pregnant mums and young puppies.

While we pride ourselves on making our kennels as calm as possible, they are still incredibly noisy and stressful for hormonal mums and developing little brains. Without our foster carers, we would never be able to say yes to so many puppies, and the loving mums who raise them. Cream's Story

Darling Cream arrived into a regional pound heavily pregnant at 9 years old.

Knowing that she would struggle significantly with birth and motherhood due to her age, we discussed termination with our veterinary team, but the pregnancy was too advanced to terminate without significant risk of complication. She had hardly any teeth left due to calcium loss with pregnancy after pregnancy but had the most beautiful gummy smile. With the help of the amazing team at **Subiaco Vet** hospital who

performed an emergency caesarean as Cream's labour became stressed, Cream became a mother for the final time to three beautiful puppies.

Her pups have all since been adopted, but darling Cream is on the hunt for her perfect retirement home.

Sweet, shy Max was dumped at the refuge with his brother Cowboy and we could immediately see what a sensitive soul he was.

Terrified in the kennels and unsure of new people, we knew Max needed to find a loving home where he could flourish and he truly found the most perfect family to call his own.

"My three teenagers and I adopted Max last July, who you probably remember, as he was inconsolable after getting abandoned right there in your office with his brother Cowboy.

I just stumbled across his old photo that was up on the website. I barely recognised him.

He was the world's saddest dog, he was even a different colour. I just had to show you him now 9 months later. He is the happiest boy and literally can't wipe the grin off his face, or keep his tongue in his mouth!

He looks like a completely different dog! His confidence is

through the roof. He no longer cowers and he walks tall and proud. He has become very vocal, loves doing tricks, loves toys, playing with the hose and loves to sing. Miley Cyrus seems to be his favourite, especially Wrecking Ball.

We have had our challenges, he is not a fan of other dogs or other people, but has improved greatly. Recently he even let a few friends and family members pat him for the 1st time! Which was a huge deal for him and made us all emotional.

Overall he has brought nothing but pure joy to our family and I don't know how we ever lived a day without him. He has also given our 13 year old kelpie Layla a new lease on life and they are best friends.

Thank you for taking care of our boy until we found him."



Beautiful girl Ella was very stressed in the kennel environment and was really struggling.

We were hoping for a wonderful family for this girl but we couldn't have imagined just how amazing her new home would be!

"Ella came home with us in October, a ball-obsessed bundle of anxiety and nerves. I was a bit nervous too...

By that time, she was in a pound and the DRC shelter for over 5 months and not coping well. The first night, I got up every 2 hours to check on her like a little newborn. She was not aggressive at all, but rather aloof and scared. As if she was wondering how long this will last.

Bit by bit, day by day we gave her love, attention and encouragement. And lots of space when she retreated. But within a week or two, she became my shadow, even sticking her head in the washing machine to inspect the laundry! Within a month or so she stopped digging in the

garden, her ball obsession was quickly waning, and she started greeting us at the door with a proper wagging-tail-puppydance when we came home. Her new favourite game now is tug-of-war.

Walking calmly on a lead on outings took a bit longer, but now it's a favourite daily activity. Ella is still not keen on all types of dogs and we're still figuring it out. But she LOVES people. Luckily she now (mostly) ignores bikes, bicycles, crows and other fast moving and noisy objects.

I never knew I had an Ella-shaped hole in my heart, but I'm so glad she came to fill it...

And I think she's glad too. After all, all she wanted was a family of her own."

Our sweet, sensitive Ferris arrived at the refuge back in 2021. Scared of new people, he spent a majority of his time out in a foster home. That's when our amazing volunteer Cass stepped up and took him out on foster. After 6 months of hard work and plenty of bonding time. Cass and her partner (and their other ex DRH resident Juniper) decided that Gideon had already found his forever home and they officially adopted him.

Sheela first came into our care all the way back in 2020 and was adopted and returned on two occasions. This gorgeous girl was lucky enough to spend plenty of time in loving foster homes before one of her foster carers finally decided she wasn't going anywhere.
